







Forest Ownership structures



60% of EU forest area is privately owned




Proportion of forest land in private ownership (%)




Distribution of private ownership across Europe (Pulla et al., 2013)



European forests are highly diverse



~15 million forest owners in EU





What is a small forest owner? importance of their motivations!

Available data* suggests that:

- In most countries, majority of forest owners (>90%) is small (≤ 10 ha)
- "Small" is different, e.g. see higher share in Nordics of owners with 11 500 ha The number of private owners with ≥ 500 ha is low across all of Europe

Forest owners motivations

- Is critical, but at risk in certain regions.
- Active forest management must at least be profitable if we are to build a biocircular economy that is more compatible with climate change mitigation.

Diversity of owners







A great fragile force to promote:

the diversity of forest management adapted to local conditions

Challenges of small ownership:

- Fragmentation and abandonment
- Limited resources and economic viability
- Legal and structural barriers





















EU Forest Owners' messages
