Needs and Challenges of Private Forest Owners in Flanders (Belgium): A Voice for Small-Scale, Non-Professional Managers

Who We Represent

Landelijk Vlaanderen vzw represents private rural landowners in Flanders.

Over 60% of forest and over 80% open space in Flanders is privately owned.

Most owners manage small forest parcels **non-professionally**: they are farmers, families, heirs, or individuals with a deep-rooted connection to the land.

Key Challenges for Private Forest Owners

- 1. Complex regulations
- 2. Lack of professional support
- 3. Limited income opportunities
- 4. Fragmented ownership
- 5. Weak representation in policy processes

We Need Clear, Accessible & Consistent Regulations

Small forest owners face increasing legal and administrative burdens. Private ownerschip rights are being restricted by societal needs (restrictions, obligations...) -> joy?

Policies around biodiversity, climate, zoning, and forest management often overlap or conflict.

We ask for protection of ownership rights and policy simplification, tailored to the reality of small-scale, multifunctional forest use.

Respect Our Role as Partners

Forest owners are not obstacles; they are part of the solution. We want recognition for the societal value we deliver:

- Carbon capture,
- · Water retention,
- Biodiversity,
- Cultural landscapes.

We ask for a voice at the table when decisions are made.

Strengthen Knowledge and Support

Most private owners are **non-professionals**: they lack technical forestry knowledge.

We need:

- Practical tools and model plans
- Access to neutral expert advice
- On-the-ground training and best practices

Public services are often not accessible or adapted to this target group.

Fair Compensation for Ecosystem Services

Forest owners provide **public goods**, but face **private costs**. We advocate for:

- Fair payment schemes for ecosystem services (PES)
- Better funding instruments for sustainable forest management
- Fiscal incentives for climate and biodiversity efforts

No sustainability without economic viability - geopolitical context!

Space for Innovation

Owners want to experiment with:

- Climate-adaptive species
- Agroforestry
- Bio-based value chains
- Multifunctional land use

Innovation projects often focus on large-scale actors.

We call for funding, support and regulatory space for small-scale innovation

Encourage Collaboration and Scale-Up

Forest parcels are highly **fragmented** in Flanders.

This complicates forest management and reduces efficiency.

Solutions:

- Cooperative models,
- Forest clusters,
- Joint management frameworks

Government support can boost these forms of collaboration.

Cut Red Tape - Simplify Administration

Owners are overwhelmed by:

- Permit applications
- Reporting duties
- Subsidy bureaucracy

We ask for:

- One-stop digital portals
- Pre-filled documents
- Less paperwork, more impact

Our Role in a Changing Landscape

Forests are at the heart of climate, biodiversity, and water policy.

Private landowners want to contribute, but only with the right tools, trust, and incentives.

Landelijk Vlaanderen helps bridge the gap between owners and policy, through:

- Capacity-building
- Networking
- Policy recommendations
- EU cooperation

Concluding Message

"If we want resilient forests, we must empower those who own and care for them."

- Let us invest in people, not just in trees.
- Let us remove barriers and overregulations, not just set targets.
- Let us build partnerships to develop income models for nonprofessional forest owners
